## OLYMPICS

During the Olympics, the medal ceremonies took place in Whistler Olympic Plaza. Find Whistler Olympic Plaza and take a photo with the Olympic Rings or the Paralympic Agitos.

## BOB SLED

Canadian women won Gold and Silver medals in the 2010 Winter Olympics, bobsleigh event. In the winter and summer, you can experience the track first hand at the Whistler Sliding Centre. Get your photo taken in a bobsled

## WHISTLER BEARS

Whistler is home to approximately 100 black bears. You may have the chance to spot one whether you're out on a hike, or taking a gondola ride up the mountain. However, you are guaranteed to spot a baby and mama bear permanently placed in the village! Find the mama and baby bear and get your photo taken with them.

## OLYMPIC MEDALS

Canada took home 26 medals at the 2010 Winter Olympic Games including 14 Gold, one of which came from Whistler's own female athlete, Ashleigh McIvor. Find "real" Olympic medals in the village? (Location open Monday – Friday)

## WHISTLER'S SISTER CITY

Sister cities are cooperative agreements between towns, cities, and even counties in geographically and politically distinct areas to promote cultural and commercial ties. Whistler's sister city was also host to Olympic Games in the winter of 1998 and summer of 1964. What is the name of Whistler's Sister City?

## WHISTLER ANIMALS

Get your photo taken with three animals you wouldn't think you would ever spot together.

*Hint: These animals are representative of Canada and can be found on the village stroll eating ice cream*

## WHISTLER MOUNTIE

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police were formed in 1920 and are the national police force of Canada. Get your photo taken with a Whistler Mountie.

*Hint: The Mountie does not have to be a person*

## INUIT WORDS FOR SNOW

Find the fire hydrant with the Inuit words for snow. What are the 6 of the words?

## WHISTLER ART MURAL

Find a piece of Whistler's history painted by Whistler local artist, Kris Kupskey. This sixty-foot long piece pays homage to our community's heritage and features iconic local figures such as Myrtle Philip, Teddy the Bear, the PGE Railway, the original Creekside Gondola, and of course, plenty of breathtaking Coast Mountain scenery. Get your photo taken with this beautiful mural.

## INUKSUK

The Inuksuk symbolizes friendship and was the official symbol for the 2010 Winter Olympics and can be found several places in Whistler village and on the mountains. Find an Inuksuk and take a group photo

## FLAGS

In Whistler we pride ourselves in our cultural diversity and welcome thousands of international visitors from around the world each year. Find five different international flags and snap a photo

## ORIGINAL GONDOLA

From 1962-1965 a company called Garibaldi Lifts Limited began development of the ski area on the south side of Whistler Mountain now known as Creekside. In 1965 the first four person gondola was in operation along with a day lodge and several ski runs. Find one of the original gondolas in the village and take a photo.

## WHISTLER BLACKCOMB LOGO

Whistler Blackcomb has a very distinct logo that symbolizes their brand – the W. The logo was selected and designed based on its elements of curve and shape, and the fluid movement associated with mountain sports, snow tracks, glacial curves, rivers, the Sea to Sky highway and mountain bike tracks. What is the nickname of the W? Find one and take a photo.

## NAMING WHISTLER

Whistler Mountain was originally known as "London Mountain" and officially became Whistler in 1965. What native animal did Whistler get its name from?

## POUTINE

Poutine is a truly Canadian dish! Originating from Quebec, this all-time favourite by visitors and locals alike is made with French fries, cheese curds, and gravy, and can be eaten several places on the mountain and off. Where can you find Poutine in Whistler? If you're feeling adventurous, give it a try and snap a photo! How many different varieties are there on the menu?

**TOTEM POLES**
